





AMERICA: MELTING POT?


• The U.S. is often depicted as a "**melting pot**," having many diverse cultures and ethnicities, come together to form the rich fabric of our Nation.

MELTING POT ERA BY 1920'S...

- In the 1900's The Melting Pot era represented "aspiration."
- We aspired, that many individuals from many nations, could melt down into a new race of men.
- Actually, this mindset, both criticizes and reduces diversity.
- For many immigrants, this mindset meant giving up your ethnic identity, traditions, in order to be accepted in America.

AMERICA IS A "SALAD"



MULTICULTURALISM& SALAD BOWL

America is best described as a salad bowl.


As with a salad, when we blend "different" ingredients into one pot, the salad IS NOT "one identity."

Multiculturalism, is like a salad, in this description, we integrate different people groups into one bowl, while at the same time, each group maintains it's own separate identity.

MELTING POT VS. PLURALISM

 Melting Pot = A place where a variety of peoples, cultures, assimilate into a cohesive WHOLE.

• Pluralism = Is a situation in which people of different social classes, races, live together in society BUT continue to have their different traditions and interests.



BETTER VIEW OF MULTICULTURALISM...

 In the "melting pot" theory of multiculturalism, various immigrant groups will tend to "melt together" <u>abandon</u> their individual cultures and eventually assimilate into one predominate society.

 With the "salad bowl theory" of multiculturalism, society is described, defined, as a heterogeneous society, in which people coexist, but retain at least some of the unique characteristics of their traditional culture.

MULTI-CULTURALISM: DEEP DIVE



BENEFITS OF MULTICULTURALISM...

- A broader picture of reality.

MULTICULTURALISM MYTHS

·Now let's talk about "multiculturalism myths."

MYTH # 1

• If I am not multicultural, meaning I choose to support being "monocultural", (a culture dominated by a single element) is this bad?

 In some cultures like Japan, South Korea, and North Korea, "monoculture" is about preserving the country's national culture (e.g. social norms, shared understanding, culture, greetings, cohesion.)

Is this bad? No. Monoculturalism holds a society together. (e.g. norms, traditions, history, dress.) Not bad...limiting.

'If I lean in to other cultures, will this "weaken" my involvement in the causes connected with my cultural group/ origin?

Kappas Present Check To Central State University

The Epsilon Gamma Chapter of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity Inc., with the cooperation from the National Headquarters of the fraternity, presented a \$1,000 dollar check made payable to Central State University to Rhonda Freeman, Director of Financial Aid, to establish the Kappa Alpha Psi Student Revolving Loan Fund.

The check was presented to Mrs. Freeman by chapter officers Gerald Scott, Erick Freeman, Anthony Sledge and Anthony B. Hill, Chapter Advisor Freeman said she thought the KAPSRLF was a wonderful idea and should benefit several students. She also said, "my records indicate that no other campus organization has ever did anything like this before."

The campus chapter donated \$500 dollars and matching grant of \$500 dollars was donated by the National Headquarters located in

Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. The KAPSRLF is administered through and by the rules and regulations of Central State University. The loan is available to all full-time students currently enrolled at CSU and who have a need for emergency funds. The minimum loan is \$100 dollars and the maximum loan should not exceed \$300 dollars. Applications for loans from this fund should be made and approved at the Financial Aid Office.

Gerald Scott (Polemarch) of the Epsilon Gamma Chapter said "the members of the fraternity are very proud of this accomplishment, and by doing so became the first chapter in the Middle-Western Province (which consists of a five state region) to start the KAPSRLF on its campus." Scott also said that very few people are aware of the short term loan and that it is now in and available to persons who qualify.

MULTI-CULTURALISM - PROJECTIONS....

 Lydia Michael, a branding expert for a company out of Detroit says: In 2044, the US Census Bureau projects, 50% of population is going to be <u>multicultural</u>.

 We should not only think only about what this means as a consumer...

 We should also think, what does this statistic mean for America's "students" as multicultural leaders.

MULTI-CULTURAL EDUCATION IS IMPORTANT FOR OUR STUDENTS WHY?

- 1. Gives students safe place to learn and dialogue.
- 2. Dialogue allows me to acknowledge and respect.
- 3. Helps students become culturally intelligent vs. avoidance of other cultures.
- 4. Helps students understand the power of empathy.
